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1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Background

In early July 2004, the Department of Primary Industries, Water and Environment invited comment on proposals to recommend the reservation, under the *Nature Conservation Act 2002*, of a number of parcels of Crown land on King Island. A list of parcels and their proposed reservation status was released for information and comment.

The reservation proposals were based principally on a study conducted by the Department of Primary Industries, Water and Environment and published as “The Native Vegetation of King Island, Bass Strait” (R.W.Barnes, F.Duncan & C.S Todd, 2002).

1.2 Consultation Process

Key stakeholders were notified of the proposals, including adjacent landholders. Staff of the Department visited King Island with representatives from the Parks and Wildlife Service on 22 July 2004. Meetings were held with the Council and with the King Island Natural Resource Management Group. Initially, comment was requested to be submitted by 20 August 2004, but the comment period was extended to 30 September 2004.

A report on that consultation and recommendations for reservation was prepared and published in October 2004. Subsequently, the consultation period on the 20 parcels was extended and concluded on 21 January 2005. During that period, two meetings were held on King Island with local representatives of the Tasmanian Farmers and Graziers Association (TFGA). As a result, a revised report and recommendations on those 20 properties has been prepared. This is the revised report.

2 RESERVE PROPOSALS

2.1 Introduction

This report summarises the comment received on the reserve proposals, including comment received from the TFGA during the extended comment period, and the response to that comment. All comments received have been considered in developing the final proposals. A brief overview on the general comments received is provided. Then, final proposals are listed in turn for each reserve. These final proposals will be considered by the Crown Land Assessment and Classification Project Steering Committee before being submitted to the Minister and Cabinet for approval.

2.2 Overview of Comments

Comments specific to a particular parcel proposed for reservation are discussed under the specific heading for that land parcel. However, a number of comments canvassed issues broader than the reservation process, generally concerning management issues rather than reservation of the land. These are discussed below.

Suggestions were given about the management planning process, and management practices and resourcing, including fire management. These matters are addressed through the provisions of the *National Parks and Reserves Management Act 2002*, which covers management planning. The Parks and Wildlife Service undertake this. Management plans are prepared according to that Act and must include public consultation in their formulation. All the land proposed for reservation is already the management responsibility of the Crown. Once reserved, this will be undertaken by the Parks and Wildlife Service.

A number of respondents raised concerns about fencing. The Crown is exempt in law from fencing and as a matter of practice does not fence Crown land including both unallocated Crown land and reserved land. Fencing of reserved land is not a requirement of the reserve category. Fencing can be one management technique if required to protect natural and cultural values.

Some comments suggested that Conservation Area status would be insufficient to protect values. However, the assessment is that conservation values are sufficiently protected by the reserve categories that are proposed in this report. Other respondents were concerned that the proposed reserve categories would prevent mining. However, all the reserves proposed have been checked for their mining potential and will allow for it where appropriate.

Some concern was expressed about browsing wildlife, but this is a management issue, not directly affected by a change in status of the land through reservation.

Questions were raised about vehicular access and camping. While camping is not usually permitted in a Nature Reserve, it is permitted in the other categories of reserves, subject to management prescriptions to protect values and limit impacts. This is also the case with vehicular access, which is permitted along roads. Access off-road requires an authority from the management authority.

A concern was expressed about entry fees. However, entry fees only apply to national parks. None of the proposed reserves are national parks and entry fees will not apply.

Two respondents requested more time to comment. The comment period was extended by 6 weeks until 30 September 2004. The TFGA requested and was granted a further extension until 21 January 2005, making a total consultation period of 7 months.

Questions were raised about camping and vehicular access over Crown land. The proposed category of State Reserve allows for camping and access on formed roads, subject to management prescriptions. See also issues discussed in 2.2.

Concern was expressed about camping. State reserves allow for camping, subject to management prescriptions. One submission suggested that grazing be allowed to continue under licence in the area. However, grazing is not appropriate in a State Reserve with identified conservation values. See also issues discussed in 2.2.

Access to harvest eels under licence was raised as an issue. Provided access is on a road and in conformity to management and licence prescriptions, access to harvest eels will continue to be available. Access for shooting, camping and fishing was raised as an issue. The values of the area as a wetland are best protected by the proposed nature reserve, which will exclude camping, and shooting but not fishing. Fishing is permitted, subject to Inland Fisheries requirements. Access to water sources for stock was raised as an issue because of the lack of any real rivers or creeks in the locality and because sandy soils make dams impractical. It is recommended that the reserve not be proclaimed until, where there is no practical alternative, any necessary and suitable access points or arrangements, and impact protection measures to allow for stock watering have been identified. This will require on-site inspection. See also issues discussed in 2.2.

Additional information was supplied on request. Concern was expressed about camping. The proposed boundary of the nature reserve will be moved inland so that the existing camping area at the mouth of the river is not within the nature reserve. Access for shooting and fishing was raised as an issue. The values of the area are best protected by the proposed nature reserve, which will exclude shooting but not fishing. Fishing is permitted, subject to Inland Fisheries requirements. Access to water sources for stock was raised as an issue because of the lack of any other real rivers or creeks in the locality and because sandy soils make dams impractical. It is recommended that the reserve not be proclaimed until, where there is no practical alternative, any necessary and suitable access points or arrangements, and impact protection measures to allow for stock watering have been identified. This will require on-site inspection. See also issues discussed in 2.2.

Reserve as Nature Reserve (no change to proposal, but change to boundaries for camping and not to be proclaimed until stock watering measures described above are dealt with)

Access to harvest eels under licence was raised as an issue. Provided access is on a road and in conformity to management and licence prescriptions, access to harvest eels will continue to be available. Concern was expressed about access for duck shooting, and in the case of this proposal, a change of category to Game Reserve is proposed as the objectives for Game Reserve allow for taking of game. This change will not affect protection of reserve values in this location

as the other objectives for game reserve parallel those of nature reserve. Access to water sources for stock was raised as an issue because of the lack of any real rivers or creeks in the locality and because sandy soils make dams impractical. It is recommended that the reserve not be proclaimed until, where there is no practical alternative, any necessary and suitable access points or arrangements, and impact protection measures to allow for stock watering have been identified. This will require on-site inspection. See also issues discussed in 2.2.

Access of stock to the lagoon was raised, but is not compatible with the conservation values of the proposed reserve. Access to harvest eels under licence was raised as an issue. Provided access is on a road and in conformity to management and licence prescriptions, access to harvest eels will continue to be available. Concern was expressed about access for duck shooting, and in the case of this proposal, a change of category to Game Reserve is recommended as the objectives for Game Reserve allow for taking of game. This change will not affect protection of reserve values in this location as the other objectives for game reserve parallel those of nature reserve. Concern was expressed about camping and recreational activity, as Lake Flanagan is a large lake and a focus for recreation. The revised category of Game Reserve allows for camping, subject to management prescriptions. Concern about fishing was raised. Fishing is permitted, subject to Inland Fisheries requirements. Some concern was expressed about browsing wildlife, but this is a management issue, not affected by a change in status of the land. Access to water sources for stock was raised as an issue because of the lack of any real rivers or creeks in the locality and because sandy soils make dams impractical. It is recommended that the reserve not be proclaimed until, where there is no practical alternative, any necessary and suitable access points or arrangements, and impact protection measures to allow for stock watering have been identified. This will require on-site inspection. See also issues discussed in 2.2.

It is recommended that the reserve not be proclaimed until, where there is no practical alternative, any necessary and suitable access points or arrangements, and impact protection measures to allow for stock watering have been identified. This will require on-site inspection. See also issues discussed in 2.2.

Access to harvest eels under licence was raised as an issue. Provided access is on a road and in conformity to management and licence prescriptions, access to harvest eels will continue to be available. Concern was expressed about access for duck shooting, camping and fishing. However the values of the area as a wetland of national significance are best protected by the proposed nature reserve which will exclude camping and shooting but not fishing. Fishing is permitted, subject to Inland Fisheries requirements. Access to water sources for stock was raised as an issue because of the lack of any real rivers or creeks in the locality and because sandy soils make dams impractical. It is recommended that the reserve not be proclaimed until, where there is no practical alternative, any necessary and suitable access points or arrangements, and impact protection measures to allow for stock watering have been identified. This will require on-site inspection. See also issues discussed in 2.2.

This may require on-site inspection. See also issues discussed in 2.2.

Access for shooting, camping and fishing was raised as an issue. An alternative submission requested that duck shooting not be provided for. The values of the area as a wetland containing a listed species are best protected by the proposed nature reserve, which will exclude camping, and shooting but not fishing. Fishing is permitted, subject to Inland Fisheries requirements. Access to water sources for stock was raised as an issue because of the lack of any real rivers or creeks in the locality and because sandy soils make dams impractical. It is recommended that the reserve not be proclaimed until, where there is no practical alternative, any necessary and suitable access points or arrangements, and impact protection measures to allow for stock watering have been identified. This will require on-site inspection. See also issues discussed in 2.2.
